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

Main picture: Mike and Arlene Chapman with their Chenard Senechal. Inset:- Message on detail on side of bonnet — "Ma petite maîtresse française", which means "My little French mistress"! The Chenard Senechal has a 1.5 litre side valve engine of 8 HP (European method of measurement). Senechal was a pilot in the first world war and raced with great success cycle class cars for Chenard Walcker in the early 20s. In 1925 Senechal handed over the production of his highly successful range of cycle class cars to Chenard Walcker and the Chenard Senechal was the result. These cars were only produced until 1929 and therefore very few survive.



The New Standard "8"

To satisfy the demand for a small car at a reasonable price, the Standard Motor Co. (Aust.)
Pty. Ltd., recently introduced the Standard Economy Eight. This car, which is being sold in NSW for £755/10/- including Sales Tax, is powered with a 4-cylinder, overhead valve 803 cc. engine developing 26 bhp at 4,500 rpm. Its compression ratio is 7.4 to 1.

A four-speed gearbox with a


A four-speed gearbox with a central control is fitted. Four-wheel hydraulic brakes are used, with a

mechanical hand-brake operating on the rear wheels. In keeping with a recent trend, the clutch is operated through a hydraulic link-

age.
The body is of the four-door type, and seats four people. The boot has a storage space of 12 cu. ft, and with the rear seats folded forward, 38 cu. ft are available. There is no boot lid, access to the boot being from inside.

The car is said to be capable of 62.5 mph, and at normal driving speeds is said to give a fuel consumption of 45 to 48 mpg. Its weight with fuel, oil and water is 14 cwt.

Glenn Boerth just happened to be celebrating his birthday, but would not divulge which one??!! We presented Glenn with a token birthday cake - a chocolate donut.



ROCKER COVER RACERS

I have been given some information on "Rocker Cover Racers" by Marlene and Alan Hagger, which may be of interest to some of our members. I believe that the article is from the internet and I have reproduced it in the original wording. – Ed.)

Rules for ROCKER COVER RACERS - herein after called CARS.

The "CAR" should consist of real automobile rocker cover, and be at least 80% of total vehicle

- Nothing will extend beyond front or rear of the rocker cover
- There will be NO form of propulsion
- Cars must have 4 wheels
- Wheels must have non metallic surfaces in contact with the track
- There will be NO moveable (adjustable) weights.

- 30in 760mm overall length
- 15in 380mm overall width (our cars are about 190 to 200 mm wide to fit on our tracks)
- 10in 255 mm overall height
- 10pnds 4-5 kgs max weight
- 2in 50mm max ground clearance
- 6in 150mm max wheel diameter

The COURSE should consist of

- A launch incline is 8ft 2.44 mtrs long followed by a level run of 20ft 6-10 mtrs (our tracks are 4 sections of 8 feet or 2.44mtrs)
- The launch incline will be 2 feet 610mm high at the rear, and have 2 lanes each 18in 460mm wide (our track is 295 mm wide)
- The START is 2ft 610 mm from the top end, use mechanical start/stops gate
- The races should be run in heats until a winner is "found"
- Most Clubs run the best of 3 runs for each heat, including the finals (we have used the Round Robin scoring)
- You may use judges to define winners of the heats and the finals
- The official who chooses the winner possibly should have bodyguards and be whisked away to a safe and secure place immediately he/she declares a winner.

These rules are generally accepted all over the world. They are not hard and fast (but you probably don't need to say that).

Get together and have a lot of fun (BBQ maybe).





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
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
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
