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
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Run Reports

DRIVE YOUR OLD VEHICLE DAY / ECONOMY RUN (1/12/17)

The first day of spring. But when we arrived at the clubrooms to start the run, it certainly did not feel like it. It was fine enough, but the wind was bitterly cold. However, on the run to Mount Pleasant, the sun came out and it all became quite enjoyable, well, at least in the cars. On arrival at Mount Pleasant, the wind had dropped off, so smoko under the showgrounds covered area was still very comfortable. Then we had a couple of showers of rain. Someone mentioned that it always rains at Mount Pleasant. It certainly seems to.

Soon enough it was time to depart. The route I had chosen was a very pretty little drive to Menglers Hill, along some roads that I felt most would not have seen before. However, most took off before me and I was very worried that they would miss the planned turnoff, as it was difficult to see. In fact it was now so warm and calm that many sought out the shade of some of the trees, as it was nearly too warm. And all around, we were treated to a wonderful display of vehicles. Someone described it as a "mini Bay to Birdwood", which was not far wrong, just like wandering around the cars at Birdwood after the run.

Members from the Strathalbyn club were there, as were the Mallee Club, the Barossa Club and of course the Gawler club, who have been successfully organising this event for years. Probably other clubs were there as well, and certainly lots of individuals. It all added up to a very varied and interesting collection of vehicles, not to mention the number of friends and acquaintances from other clubs to chat to while viewing them all. In all, 18 of our club vehicles attended, but all too soon it was time to return home and the crowd had thinned considerably by the time we left.

I must also mention that there was also a competition held for our members for the "Paul Kruger Economy Run Trophy". The aim was to estimate the fuel consumption of the Courtney's Fairmont for the day. However, in the event that more than one person arrived at the same correct fuel consumption figure, I had provided a jar of buttons, so that everyone could guess the number it contained, to act as a "Tie Breaker". RESTORATION OF A 1953 PGM TRUCK

At a Club meeting, back in 2006, Bob Weidenhofer invited someone to go with him to appraise old equipment on Lincoln Woodcock's Ambleside property which Lincoln wished to donate to the Club. I pricked up my ears when he mentioned an old Morris truck he wished to sell as well. I was not interested in purchasing the truck, but just interested to see if it was the same model as we used to have.

Arriving at Lincoln's property, we were led to a small old shed, with the bottom of the door buried in dirt and grass, which had not been opened for 35 years. We were able to dig our way in through the access door to find some sort of vehicle covered in old doors, pipes, timber and the

usual junk that one accumulates over 35 years. Lincoln says to me, "Do you want it?" I say, "Want what?" Lincoln says, "The

truck!" I say, "What truck?" So he starts removing the old doors and timber, etc., and there it is! The ugliest, rustiest, dustiest and most disgusting Morris I have ever seen — absolute sacrilege! This should never happen to a Morris!

On closer inspection, it was worse than I thought. The cab was one of

those mongrels that ETSA and PMG widened out to accommodate an extra passenger.

We finally dug the dirt and grass from the front door to get it open, so we could see the front of the truck. It looked like a sad, old dog about to die. I have always had a soft spot for old dogs, so guess what?

After some quiet negotiation with the powers that be, I called my old mate, Forest, to load it on his truck to bring it home. So we pumped up the tyres and towed it out with the Furgy, down this narrow alley between the sheds, and

hooked it up to tow it backwards onto the truck, Forest winching and me steering. As we got to the

top of the ramps, the hook comes undone. Went between the shed at 40 miles per hour and travelled 50 metres before stopping – no brakes. Once again, we hook on the Furgy!

Arriving home to the powers that be, standing with hands on the hips, I hear "What do you think you are going to do with that heap of rusty junk? If you think you're shifting the caravan out of the shed to put that heap of junk in its place, you can build a carport for the van right now!" "Yes dear".


Drew up the plans for the carport and sent it to the Council. Now, the truck!

After some research, I found this truck was used by the PMG as a line vehicle. It is a six cylinder overhead valve, 4.4 litre NVS 12/3, 2-3 ton, last registered in 1972 and stored in the shed for 35 years. (I purchased it in February 2007 and completed the restoration on 24/12/08.)

The engine won't turn, 2nd and 3rd cylinders rusted and seized in the block, so removed the engine for rebuild. Re-sleeved the two cylinders and honed the others, which were in good order, cut and

ground the valves, (erything else seemed OK), completely dismantled and cleaned, a coat of paint and reassembled. Then stood it aside to refit later.

Now the body. Bad rust in roof turret, covered by a sheet of galvanized iron and pop riveted, so cut the turret off and reformed 1.6 sheet and





The front guards were badly rusted and out of alignment so cutting and welding in new material was needed. To pull the dents out and realign them, I put chocks under the wheels, welded a bracket to the dent in the guard and used a cable and turn buckle tied to the shed post. It worked a treat! All this work was done with the minimum of suitable

tools, no real panel beating tools at all, just a ball pane hammer and a nice smooth river rock, so a lot of welding, grinding and filling

which took a lot of ingenuity and time.

I intended to rebuild the timber tray, but, as I started work on it, it was completely rotten and full of worm holes. Luckily, I found a tray of the very same vintage in good order, which I was able to cut and shut to fit the chassis.





The brake shoes had plenty of meat left on them, but I thought it best to re-sleeve the wheel cylinders and the master cylinder. The booster was not working, so I fitted a new kit, which was, luckily, still available.

As it can't be fully loaded now, I removed two leaves out of each rear spring to give a better ride, and I am pleased I did.

With the major problems fixed, as we all know, the finishing of all the little things – brake lines, wiring, lights, generator, glass refitting, mudflaps, towbar, etc., seem to take forever, but I finally got it done.

With the tray fitted and most of the assembly completed, it was time to rub down and prepare for the paint. Some of the paintwork I thought was good enough to just rub down and repaint. Not a good idea! I have been disappointed that I did not remove the paint from these areas. One day I

shall do it again.



I never intended to bring this truck up to anything more than the way it was delivered from the dealer's yard. As the cab was fitted specially for PMG, there was nothing flash about the way it was finished off. Some of the timber in the cab still has the saw marks showing, not even planed off, that is the way they were, so I tried to restore it to that same level.

The restoration was finished on the 24th December, 2008,

almost 2 years from the starting date. 95% of the work I did myself. It was only the machining of the engine and the brakes that I had done by the qualified people outside. Although it took a




long time to restore, I found it very interesting and satisfying and enjoyed the whole project.


The Council approval for the carport has been approved, so now, on with the carport.


