Membership Renewals

Last year, this club agreed to change its constitution in an effort to improve and simplify things, particularly relating to membership renewals. Just to make sure that we all understand, it may be a good idea to go through it again. The "Log Book" handling I will leave to the registrars to detail in the next magazine. So here we go:

- The 2018/2019 fees that you have already paid (that is, LAST YEAR) give you an extra 3 months membership **FREE for this time only**.
- The "Membership Renewal Form" was issued with the Magazine at the beginning of **April**, and to those who do not receive the Paper Magazine, at the same time by Australia Post.
- You can pay your fees (\$35) to the treasurer at the **May, June or July** meetings, or if you prefer, by post (cheque) or direct bank transfer **BEFORE the July** meeting.
- Please return your "Membership Renewal Form" with your payment or to treasurer if using direct bank transfer.
- Remember, there is **NO LONGER** a grace period. If you have NOT paid your fees by or at the **AGM** (this year, Tuesday 2nd. July), you are no longer considered a member and the DPTI **MUST** be advised and will commence cancellation of your Club Registration, if you have it with this club. If you decide that you wish to remain a member at that stage, you will need to re-apply to the club, be voted in at a meeting and pay your fees. If you also need Club Registration for your vehicle, you will need a new MR334 from the Registrars, a vehicle inspection, and the MR334 must then be presented to Service SA. If all this seems a lot of trouble, IT IS. But we, as a club have no say in this, it is the RULES. **So, PLEASE, if only for your own sake, pay your fees on or before the 2nd. July.**

If any of this is still unclear, please talk to Claude or myself (John Courtney), Ricky Kaak (Treasurer) or Jamie Brine (Registrar). Again, please do not leave it till too late to avoid additional work for ALL of us.

Log Book – Important Changes (AGAIN!)

Last year at the June Meeting and also in the June/July 2018 Auto Torque, I advised that we had been told by the DPTI that we were required to sign our Log Books for EACH driver of the club vehicle, necessitating multiple entries in the Log Book if there were multiple drivers on any given day. It was understood that this was as a result of legal advice that they (the DPTI) had received. I am not aware of what has changed, either their legal advice or the wording of the Act, but we have now been advised by the DPTI that we can now resume recording vehicle use in the Log Book as we always had in the past, that is only the first driver of the day needs to sign the Log Book and there will be only one entry in the Log Book per day.

The "Code of Practice 2017", still says:

3.6 Vehicle owners must ensure records for each journey undertaken in a conditionally registered vehicle are listed in the log book issued by the recognised motor vehicle club. The date of the journey and a brief description of the journey must be recorded before each journey commences. The driver must also sign the book (next to the particulars of use) before each journey commences.

So, just to be clear, for any given day, before the club vehicle is driven, the driver must enter the date, a brief description of the journey and their signature in the Log Book in <u>BIRO</u>. If anyone else, partner, friend or mechanic drives that vehicle on that day, there is no need to put any other entry in the Log Book. The only exception would be if that journey extended past midnight, it would then be over two days, and would need another entry.

This surely reverts to the original intent of the log book, that is to ensure that a vehicle on Club Registration is not used more than 90 days per year.

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
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


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Run Reports

HILLS RUN (10/4/19)

Old Government House Run, Belair

The first part of our run to Old Government House at Belair followed the "old road to Adelaide" route as far as Stirling and what memories that brought back. Not only the road itself, but all the little shortcuts that we had to use when trying to overtake trucks and semi-trailers. How did we ever survive? But on a lovely autumn day this was a very pleasant drive despite the very dry conditions. As we got closer to our destination, the countryside did start to green up a bit and the trees started to show their autumn colours. This was more like I had envisaged.

So, having met up with the Wegeners and Chapmans at Kanmantoo and Tony Brine at Mount Barker, we all made it to the Belair National Park despite my

best efforts to lose a few in the back blocks of Stirling. I was impressed that they all arrived. We proceeded to Old Government House, where we were welcomed by Ray Wilkins and his merry band of helpers. There were too many of us to do the tour in one group, so we had to split, one group doing the tour straight away, the other having tea, coffee and scones, then the groups swapping over. Weren't the scones great? However, I did not think we would all survive when something that sounded like a small truck hit the roof. Ray calmly explained it was only a Bunya nut from the

huge tree overhanging the building we were in, but we never did work out if it fell by its own accord, was dropped by the cockies or thrown by the Koala.

The guided tour started in the Old Government house itself. Built in 1860 as the Governor's summer residence, in reality it was more of a hunting lodge. Although a lovely building, it is not large and nothing as grand as the summer house at Marble Hill that replaced it around 1880. As the Governors of the time used their own furniture, none of the items currently on display are

original, however they are period correct and have their own stories to tell, generally having been previously owned by some of

South Australia's prominent citizens. The indoor plunge pool is original though, the first in the state.

When the

Fed by spring water and not heated, it would need to be a very hot day to entice me!

The servant's quarters and kitchen were also furnished with interesting household items of the day and provoked many comments on their uses. The gardens with their stately old trees and garden beds set the house off nicely.

Governor's residence, it firstly, till 1885,

became home to a German chemist, Max Bernbaum, who converted the servants quarters into "the Bi-Sulphide of Carbon Manufactory", where he and 9 employees produced thousands of gallons of rabbit poison to be supplied to the pastoralists, as rabbits were in plague proportions in the 1870's and 1880's.

Other residents followed before the building was opened in 1961 as a National Heritage Monument, with the Friends of Old Government House assisting in the restoration and maintenance of the property.

We thanked Ray Wilkins and the Friends of Old Government House for a very pleasant and interesting morning before retiring to a nearby shelter shed for lunch in the brilliant sunshine. What a pleasant setting. Eventually the group dispersed to return home, although most could not resist a visit to the nearby State Flora Nursery. I was impressed with the size of the whole setup and the variety of plants and "things" for sale. I had thought that it may be tailored to high rainfall areas, but that was not the case, as we purchased a couple of plants that may even survive in our dry garden. Others must have thought so too, as quite a few plants seemed to head off towards Murray Bridge.

And so it was time for us to head off home too. Thanks to all those who attended, hope you enjoyed the day.

PINNAROO CAMPOUT (26TH TO 28TH APRIL, 2019)

Four Auto Clubs Celebrate 40 Years.

The weekend of Friday 26th-27th-28th of April saw the getting together in Pinnaroo to celebrate the 40th year of the "Conrod Trophy", by the Bordertown Vehicle Restorers Club (BVRC), Murray Mallee Auto Club (MMAC), Riverland Vintage & Classic Car Club (RVCCC), and the Auto Collectors Club of Murray Bridge (ACCMB).

The "Conrod Campout" started its life at Blanchetown between the RVCCC and the ACCMB. A few years later the BVRC indicated their willingness to join with RVCCC and ACCMB, thus the beginning of the three clubs gathering in the mallee town of Pinnaroo. Then in approximately 2009 the MMAC indicated their desire to join the other three clubs. One of the weekend's organizers, Steve Williams of Pinnaroo, proclaimed the weekend to be a great success, with members and their vehicles coming from BVRC – 26, MMAC – 12, RVCCC -15 and ACCMB – 28, a good number of members to compete for the annual trophy.

The weekend began with a few members, mainly from MMAC, RVCCC along with ACCMB meeting at Karoonda on Friday afternoon, camping at the caravan park and attending the Karoonda pub for tea.

Saturday morning saw the numbers bolstered by members of various clubs arriving for the weekend. After morning tea, it was off to Karoonda's Pioneer Park to view many exhibits from "yesteryear",



My car is difficult to start And when the engine's wound, The handle throws you in the air Or hurls you to the ground.


Some people like a three-tone job In cream and black and pink With ashtrays lined with beaten gold, And cushions trimmed with mink.

The wrecker's torch will soon be lit, He hasn't long to wait. My car belongs to '34 And this is '58.





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






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
